My Child Has Died... Don't expect me to be Thankful

Friends...if this is your first Thanksgiving since the death of your child, I am very sorry. There is nothing I can say here to make it any better; wish I could. Everyone has to do the holiday thing in their own way...whatever might make you the most comfortable. I will share with you part of my Thanksgiving traditions.

For years our family had gone away for Thanksgiv-

ing. We were joined by extended family and it was always a good time. When our kids were little, we went camping and cooked the turkey outside in a smoker. Some great memories were created.

The kids got older and I figured out that fixing a big meal outdoors was only for everyone else, not the ones bringing everything for it and fixing it! Our plan then changed and we began going to a hotel on the beach. Now that was the way to go! We had a big suite, nice heated pool at ocean's edge and maid service!

Then one year, Brad died two months before Thanksgiving. I could not fathom being thankful. My child had died! All the hotel arrangements had been made the year before. We were on automatic pilot and just went with the flow. We did insist on everyone sharing a memory with Brad and lighting a candle in his memory. When I made this request there were probably some anxious moments. I don't remember nor did I care. In some ways, I think it was good for us, sticking with some of the traditions that Brad loved and adding new ones to honor him. Was it hard? No doubt. Should we have stayed home...gone somewhere else? No matter where we would have gone, he still would not have been there...there is no getting around that.

The pain would have been with us no matter where we were.

We told Brad we loved him, writing it in huge letters in the sand. I spent quiet moments by myself, walking on the beach. I cried by myself and with others. I even laughed a couple of times as we shared silly moments of other Thanksgiving days with Brad. Most of the day, I felt I was in the "twilight zone"...participating but removed.

That night, when I was by myself, I sat and wrote a letter to Brad...a letter telling him how thankful I was that he was my son, that I had him for those 17 years, 364 days. That I was thankful for every moment, great, good and not so good. I was thankful for the love we still had. Have I ever had a "normal" Thanksgiving again? NO...no. I have rearranged things in my mind...some things I keep to myself so others can fully enjoy the day. But I always include Brad in some way. I cannot change that he is no longer physically here...so I have to change my world to make way for this new life of mine and make the best of it.

Ten Tips to Surviving the Difficult Holidays after your Child Dies

1. Plan ahead. Realize you will not be able to do everything with everyone. Decide what is truly important to you and your family.

2. Don't be afraid to ask friends for help. Tasks which may normally take little effort can feel overwhelming, whether it's fixing a meal, cleaning the house, or putting up decorations.

3. No one expects you to string rows and rows of lights just to prove you have the holiday spirit. If you don't feel up to past efforts, you may simply want to place an electric powered candle in your window in memory of your child.

4. Just because you've hosted holiday gatherings in the past doesn't mean you're obligated to this year. Others will understand.

5. After a child dies, old traditions are often left behind and new ones that incorporate the child who died can take their place. Honor the memory of your child in unique ways that have meaning to you.

6. Surviving children should be included in your plans. They, too, mourn their sibling, but need a normalcy the holidays can provide.

7. If you don't get everything done you plan, be easy on yourself. Grief is tough work and you should never feel guilty for not getting everything done.

8. If you must shop for others, find a time when the stores are not extremely busy like early morning, order through the Internet, or ask others to shop for you.

9. Participating in a memorial service, such as The Compassionate Friends Worldwide Candle Lighting the second Sunday in December, can be very meaningful. This can be done in a formal service with others or through a short private candle lighting in the privacy of your home.

10. Remember that the fearful anticipation of an approaching holiday is usually worse than the day



Reading is a Haven... Not a Place to Hide

In memory of Todd Mennen

Some people like to read. Some people live to read. Since I was a child I have read about four books a week. So it was only natural that I develop a new reading style when my son died in December of 2002. For a week I read Todd's obituary over and over again. I had written it. Was it suitable? I second guessed myself about that for some time.

The week after Todd's death I began reading short poems, articles and short stories. I would find myself stopping and starting, re-reading a line over and over again until it finally penetrated my brain.

After a month I began reading books again. It was difficult, but I found books which were suitable to my current state of mind. Books about peace, serenity, self-help, death, the afterlife. Soon I found a web site devoted to grief resources. I ordered several books and devoured them.

Reading helped to fill the giant hole in my spirit; it helped me to realize that others had walked this road and had actually survived. I was certain for the first three months after Todd's death that I wouldn't survive: in fact. I didn't want to survive.

Finally I decided to read the types of books I had always read.... history, biography,

mysteries, current events analysis, funny books, sad books, books with a message. I lived in my books; for a brief period I didn't exist....the only reality was the book I was reading.

Not everyone reads. Some parents spend great amounts of time in thoughtful reflection, in prayer, in meditation. Others watch television and movies. Many retreat within themselves, too emotionally

pummeled to talk. Others lose themselves in their work. All balance is removed from each life, no matter what we choose.

And that's what had happened to me. I had removed the balance from my life by escaping into books. After almost three months of reading, withdrawing into other worlds and living in books, I went to a meeting of the Compassionate Friends. I realized I was not balanced, grounded or centered. I realized, too, that escaping into alternative realities was not the answer.

That first meeting was frightful. My life consisted of work and home and nothing else. I imagined all kinds of terrible scenarios. But yet, I went. I met caring parents who seemed to have their lives in order. The second meeting was better; by the third meeting I was talking....in short sentences.

Gradually over more than two years, I became a participant in the meeting and in the

process. I volunteered to help.....just a little at first, then more as time went on. I went to seminars. I sorted through the pain, the agony, the horror I was feeling. I began to achieve a balance.

My husband and I began spending weekends in the country with my family. This was a positive change for me. A friend would stop at my office and bring lunch every week. I invited a few people to our home, I couldn't see it then, but I was on the road to becoming "rebalanced". My reality is different now: my only child is dead. Much of who I am is wrapped in being Todd's mom. But my "rebalanced self' has a changing perspective. I have become more grounded through the Compassionate Friends. Sharing my feelings and listening to others has helped me to become centered and balanced. Reading is still my passion, but it is not my life.

Each of us finds an escape from the world after the death of our child..... something to revise our history and help us survive. But eventually we must seek balance, find ways of coping with our soulshattering loss and ground ourselves in our new reality. The Compassionate Friends has done all of that for me. But I had to take the first step.
